



Nearly two decades of low trust in government


% who say they trust the government in Washington to do what is right most/all of the time


Trust in government, by party

% who say they trust the government in Washington to do what is right most/all of the time






Partisanship factors into views of the federal government

Public views of the Supreme Court at 35 year low


% who say they have a(n) ____ opinion of the Supreme Court

Partisan gap in views of Supreme Court now wider than at any point in more than three decades


% who say they have **favorable** opinion of the Supreme Court

Views of Congress remain more negative than in past decades


% who have a ___ view of Congress

% who say **compromise in politics is** ...



% who say the federal government has a responsibility to provide ____ for all Americans






Low confidence in political appointees, and declining confidence in career government employees



Large shares in many publics say their political system needs reform


% who say the political system in (survey public) ...


Americans more likely than others to say most politicians are corrupt


