THE ASIAN INSTITUTE



KEYNOTE PANEL



Rachel Silvey

Rachel Silvey is Richard Charles Lee Director of the Asian Institute and Professor in the Department of Geography and Planning. She is a Faculty Affiliate in CDTS, WGSI, and the Ethnic, Immigration and Pluralism Studies Program. She received her Ph.D. in Geography from the University of Washington, Seattle, and a dual B.A. from the University of California at Santa Cruz in Environmental Studies and Southeast Asian Studies. Professor Silvey is best known for her research on women's labour and migration in Indonesia. She has published widely in the fields of migration studies, cultural and political geography, gender studies, and critical development. Her major funded research projects have focused on migration, gender, social networks, and economic development in Indonesia; immigration and employment among Southeast Asian-Americans; migration and marginalization in Bangladesh and Indonesia; and religion, rights and Indonesian migrant women workers in Saudi Arabia.



The Honourable Senator Thanh Hai Ngo

The Honourable Senator Thanh Hai Ngo was appointed to the Senate on September 6, 2012, by the Right Honourable Governor General David Johnston on the advice of the Right Honourable Prime Minister Stephen Harper. Senator Ngo immigrated to Canada in 1975 following the fall of Saigon and the rise of communism in Vietnam. He is the first Canadian of Vietnamese origin to sit in the Senate. In Parliament, Senator Ngo continues to advocate for freedom, democracy, human rights and the rule of law, and he continues to be a champion against oppression in Vietnam and around the world.



Irene Poetranto

Irene Poetranto is a Senior Researcher for the Citizen Lab and a Doctoral Student in Political Science at the University of Toronto. Her primary research interest is on cybersecurity policy development in the Global South, especially in the Asia-Pacific region. She obtained her Master's degree in Political Science and Asia-Pacific Studies from the University of Toronto, and a Bachelor's degree in Political Science from the University of British Columbia.

Dennis Lee

Dennis Lee is a Senior Business Development Specialist with the Ontario Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade. He is responsible for increasing the number of foreign and domestic investments attracted to the province, and serves as a sector expert for emerging technologies like flexible & hybrid electronics (FHE) and additive manufacturing. Dennis joined the Ontario Public Service in 2011 after receiving his Master of Public Policy studies at the University of Toronto. Prior to this, he held a number of research-oriented roles, including positions with the City of Toronto and St. Michael's Hospital. His passion for policy issues prompted him and his friends to create "Beyond the Headlines," a current affairs radio show that continues to air on CIUT 89.5 FM. He also holds an Honours Bachelor of Arts degree from UofT, where he completed his training in the Collaborative Master's in Asia-Pacific Studies program.



Sarah Alam

Sarah Alam is an EdD (Doctor of Education) student pursuing a collaborative program in Social Justice Education and South Asian Studies at the University of Toronto. She is also a former Public Diplomacy Specialist at U.S. Mission in Karachi Pakistan for the Sindh and Baluchistan provinces from 2010-2018. She is certified in grants management and has experience in social activism, professional development training, team leadership, and NGO Management. At present, she is working at the Asian Institute at the Munk School of Global Affairs and Public Policy. She is the founder Chairperson of the North American Association for South Asian Affairs (NAASAA), a registered not for profit organization based in Canada working to address Social Justice Issues in the South Asian region. She has served for several years on not for profit organizations in Pakistan as their board member and Director, including IEARN Pakistan, Special Olympics of Pakistan, Young Social Reformers, and Pak-US Alumni Network. She availed 18 International Scholarships and three USG funded exchange programs. She has also taught media studies and business communication to undergraduate students as a visiting lecturer at the University of Karachi and Jinnah University for Women.

Sidney Chiu

With a focus on films with international appeal, Sidney Chiu's producing credits include LOVE JACKED, a Canada South African romantic comedy co-production starring Amber West and Keith David-winner of the Best Narrative Feature at the Pan African Film Festival (Los Angeles) 2018. COCONUT HERO, a Canada German co-production with Six Island Productions and UFA Fiction directed by Florian Cossen and Lola nominated, winner of the Best Film in Focus at the Zurich Film Festival in 2015, BANG BANG BABY starring Jane Levy, and Peter Stormare for Scythia Films, winner of the Claude Jutra Award at the Toronto International Film Festival in 2015. Sidney was also the Production Manager on the Mandarin romantic comedy FINDING MR RIGHT, which grossed over 80 Million USD. THREE DAYS IN HAVANA starring Gil Bellows directed by Tony Pantages and Gil Bellows, shot in Havana Cuba with E1 distributing in Canada. Sidney's first produced feature entitled A NIGHT FOR DYING TIGERS written / directed by Terry Miles premiered at TIFF in 2012.



Anita Li

Anita Li is a media consultant and journalism professor who has worked as a multiplatform journalist in Toronto, New York City and Ottawa. Anita started out her career as a reporter and editor at Canadian establishment publications, including The Toronto Star, The Globe and Mail and CBC. After that, she worked in strategic roles at American digital media startups, such as Fusion, Complex Media and Mashable. Anita was the former director of communities at The Discourse, a disruptive new player in Canadian media that fills in gaps in news coverage for underserved communities. She is also a member of the 2020-21 Online News Association board of directors. Given her unique background, Anita has established herself an industry leader and expert in journalism innovation, audience-pay business models, newsroom diversity, and media ethics. She is a frequent media commentator who has spoken on these topics in press interviews and at conferences worldwide.

Owen Guo

A storyteller and a news junkie, Owen Guo is a second-year Master of Global Affairs candidate at the Munk School. During his seven-year journalism career, he was once chased by thugs on a highway, fought government censorship, and amusingly, wrote about how Western deodorant producers failed to conquer the Chinese armpit. Before moving to Toronto, he was a researcher and writer in the Beijing bureau of the New York Times, covering business and politics in China. Prior to the Times, he was an assistant journalist for the Financial Times in Beijing, focusing on China's energy and environmental issues. He holds a master's degree in intercultural communication from Shanghai International Studies University. Currently, he's contemplating a book about Canadian niceness and its social implications.
