You will participate in a variety of student leadership initiatives, from the Beyond the Headlines podcast to the Indigenous Policy Initiative. As two-year programs, the MGA and MPP combine academic training with practical experience. In your first year, you will be introduced to the core theories and tools of multiple disciplines, exploring topics such as global security, the social context of public policy, human rights, innovation policy, economics, strategic negotiation, and digital governance.

The following summer, the School's expert staff will help you secure an internship that aligns with your skills and interests. In your second year, you will bring the experience of that internship into the classroom and your extracurricular activities, while deepening your expertise and preparing to launch your career.

Daily life at the Munk School includes lots of classes, but just as importantly, you will be immersed in a vibrant community of peers, alumni, faculty, fellows, staff, and visitors. In a single day, you might attend a morning class led by a former high-ranking civil servant, share lunch with friends from the Master of Global Affairs or Master of Public Policy programs, participate in an afternoon workshop on authoritarian censorship and social media hosted by a visiting expert, and connect with alumni at an evening networking event.

At the Munk School, from our Math-Stats Prep Courses to the day you walk across the stage in Convocation Hall to receive your diploma, you will be challenged to think both broadly and deeply. Whatever challenges you face in your career, we hope you prepare for them by spending time with us at the Munk School of Global Affairs & Public Policy.

Master of Public Policy (MPP)

The MPP core curriculum builds a strong foundation in analysis, governance, policy processes, and implementation, and includes a mandatory summer internship.

Summer prep courses in Math-Stats and Microeconomics are offered before Year 1 to help incoming students strengthen their quantitative skills. These courses are provided at no additional cost.

Year One

During the first year of the MPP program (MPP1), you will take 8 courses: seven core MPP1 courses and one core elective.

Core courses (8 courses):

- 1. Governance, Institutions and Public Policy
- 2. Microeconomics for Policy Analysis
- 3. Macroeconomics for Policy Analysis
- 4. Quantitative Methods for Policy Analysis
- 5. Social Context of Policy-Making
- 6. Implementation of Program Evaluation
- 7. Strategic Policy Implementation

Elective credit (0.5) from either:

- The Sustainability Imperative: Implications for Global Affairs and Public Policy OR Decision-Making and Strategic Thinking

Internship between Year 1 and Year 2

MPP students complete a mandatory, paid summer internship between Year 1 and Year 2 in the public, private, or non-profit sectors.

Year Two

In the second year of the MPP program (MPP2), you'll deepen your economics and qualitative skills while exploring policy electives tailored to your interests, such as AI, the environment, and global issues.

Core courses:

1.5 required credits

- Politics and the Policy Process
- Topics in Applied Economics for Public Policy
- Capstone Course: Integrating Issues in Public Policy
- Choose: 0.5 elective credit from either:
 - Ethics and the Public Interest OR
 - Moral Foundations of Public Policy
- Choose: 0.5 elective credit from either
 - Comparative Public Policy OR an alternate international/global focus course as approved by the MPP program
- Choose: 1.5 elective credits with a policy lens, of which one elective must be offered by the MPP program. The remaining courses may be taken with other University of Toronto graduate units.

Capstone project in MPP2

The Capstone course challenges MPP students to apply their skills and knowledge in developing an individual policy agenda designed to enhance the social and economic well-being of Canadians.

Joint programs & specializations

In addition to the standalone Master of Public Policy program, you can pursue a combined degree, dual degree, collaborative specialization, emphasis, or even study abroad.

- Social and Urban Policy Emphasis: complete three elective courses with themes that range from urban planning to health to Indigenous policy

Dual degree

Study in Madrid, Spain at IE University

Master of International Relations (MIR) from IE / Master of Public Policy (MPP) from U of T, Munk School

Broaden your global perspective with a dual degree: earn an MIR from IE University in Madrid and an MPP from the Munk School, University of Toronto.

In this two-year dual degree program, students complete their MIR studies at IE University in Madrid during the first year.



You will take MPP electives in Toronto during the summer after Year 1, then complete MPP core courses in Year 2, alongside a policy internship at the Munk School in the summer following Year 2. This accelerated path allows you to earn both degrees in just two years.



Internships


As part of the MPP program, and with support from our Career Services Team, you will complete a paid internship between your first and second year, tackling real-world policy challenges in the public, private, or non-profit sectors. Guided by a faculty mentor, you will apply your knowledge and make a meaningful impact.

This internship allows you to:

- Engage in policy planning, analysis, decision-making, and implementation
- Translate academic theories into practical solutions
- Explore your career path and build valuable professional connections

At the conclusion of your internship, you will submit a research report highlighting key insights and demonstrating the impact of your contributions.

In 2023, I completed my MPP internship as a Strategy Analyst at the Canada Infrastructure Bank (CIB), a federal Crown corporation mandated to invest in sustainable infrastructure that benefits Canadians. As a member of the Strategy team, I supported initiatives across sustainability, corporate reporting and planning, government relations, impact measurement, and sector strategies. I conducted research on climate resiliency for infrastructure and analyzed the CIB's potential role as a catalyst for private investment. My analysis contributed to the development of new initiatives that leveraged the CIB's investments to enhance climate resiliency while aligning with federal government priorities.

My internship, gained through the rigorous MPP program at the Munk School, highlighted the versatility of a policy degree. It provided opportunities to apply policy analysis skills, deliver research-driven insights, and build confidence briefing leaders through presentations and case competitions.

In my second year of the MPP program, I worked part-time with the CIB, complementing my policy studies and contributing to sustainability projects. As I join the CIB full-time upon graduation, I am eager to explore public and private sector opportunities to further my career as a policy analyst.







Alumni spotlight

James Drummond, MPP '15

**Policy Analyst, Regulatory Policy Division,
Public Governance Directorate, OECD**

What did you like most about the MPP program?

What I liked most was the strong sense of community built by the program. Unlike my previous degrees, the MPP program immediately emphasized and reinforced its cohort model that began in the first weeks with the math prep course and orientation week. From there, taking the majority of courses together provided a lot of opportunities to get to know and work closely with so many smart, amazing people and see policy problems from many different perspectives...This was also reinforced by extracurriculars, like the Public Good Initiative or the Ford + Munk case competition, where I got to work closely on practical and applied policy problems, deepening the connection with classmates. As a result, not only did this community help me get through the program, but it also resulted in strong friendships that have lasted years after graduating.

How has the MPP helped you in your career?

The MPP has helped my current career at the OECD in two ways. First, participating in an academic exchange to Sciences Po in Paris, France provided me both with the opportunity to improve my understanding of policy issues from an international perspective, as well as invaluable in-person opportunities to meet and network with OECD staff. Having this knowledge and network helped when I applied for internship positions after I returned to Toronto for my final semester. Second, the practical, policy-oriented communication skills we learned during the program have been an important factor in my tenure at the OECD.

Synthesizing policy problems, thinking critically about solutions, identifying practical options, and communicating clear and analytically sound solutions are core parts of my job. Especially early in my career at the OECD, I regularly called on experiences gained from the MPP program, that allowed me to contribute meaningfully to OECD projects and workstreams, giving me opportunities to move upwards in my career.

Anna-Kay also volunteers much of her time as the co-founder and Director of Funding Partnerships for the Canadian Black Policy Network and as the Director of Strategy & Governance for Leading Change Canada.

What did you like most about the MPP?

What I loved most about the MPP program was having the room to delve deep into the subject of public policy and apply it to my lived experiences to better understand the sector and how I could personally contribute to it. I entered the MPP program with a degree in environmental studies and little knowledge of political science and economics.

At times, I wasn't sure it was the right fit; however, through the skills and knowledge I gained in my courses, internship, and involvement in extracurricular activities — like the Public Policy & Governance Review and Equity, Diversity & Public Policy Initiative — I left the program feeling not only more confident in what public policy actually is, but also how I could use it to effect positive change in my communities."

How has the MPP helped you in your career?

"I entered my MPP program very curious about the ways in which the policy process impacts those outside of government. While completing my degree, I had the opportunity of co-founding the program's inaugural collaboration with the Harvard Kennedy School's Black Policy Conference. By engaging in work like this during my MPP, I gained invaluable insights into the influence that policies have on communities and vice versa."

Master of Global Affairs (MGA)

The Munk School's Master of Global Affairs is a two-year program that combines rigorous academic study with a global summer internship.

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Online prep courses in Math-Stats and Microeconomics are offered during the summer before Year 1 to help incoming students strengthen their quantitative skills. These courses are provided at no additional cost.

Year One

Core courses:

- Global Development
- Global Innovation Policy
- Global Security
- Human Rights and Global Justice
- Microeconomics for Global Affairs*
- Macroeconomics: Markets, Institutions and Growth*
- Statistics for Global Affairs

Elective one: choose one of the three options:

- GLA2034H — Decision-Making & Strategic Thinking

Elective two: choose from a list of year two elective offerings each year

Global Internship Course- GLA1007Y (between Year 1 and Year 2)

The MGA program includes a mandatory 10–16 week global summer internship with top national and international institutions, businesses, or civil society organizations.

Year Two

Core courses:

- + 5 elective courses

Students must complete at least 1.5 courses (three electives) in an emphasis, which will be noted on their transcript at graduation.

Year Two emphases:

- Development
- Innovation Policy
- Human Rights and Global Justice
- Markets
- Global Security
- The Digital World
- Global Policy
- Climate Policy

MGA students are required to take a total of 9.0 full courses or 18 half courses.


Internships

The internship is a vital component of the MGA program, providing real-world experience and valuable connections with leading corporations, international and national institutions, and civil society organizations.

Our dedicated Global Internship Manager provides personalized career support and professional development to help you secure the perfect placement. This critical skill continues to serve me today in both my professional and personal life.

The highlight of my internship was organizing the Annual Meeting in Kenya. I had the opportunity to open the last day of the conference and meet global experts dedicated to delivering quality education to children. Learning from practitioners who witness these crises firsthand was eye-opening, and I discovered my passion for dynamic teamwork and cross-sectoral collaboration. This experience solidified my commitment to humanitarian response and global development, bringing me closer to my goal of managing global development projects and ultimately launching my own social enterprise.



What did you like most about the MGA program?

I loved the fact that the MGA was not your typical academic degree with a focus on only theory. The global arena is complex and ever-changing, which requires us to be more open-minded, flexible and pragmatic when tackling everyday issues. What I found unique was that the program provided students with an opportunity to take theory and apply it in real-life settings with its research, policy labs, innovative capstone and internship programs. We also got to engage decision-makers within non-government, government and private sector organizations to understand how they are both impacted and shaped by global policies. Above all, I cherish and found it humbling to be part of a dynamic and ambitious group of global students from all walks of life looking to make a difference in their homes, communities, and countries.

How has your MGA helped you in your career?

The MGA helped me realize that my academic background could be leveraged in a variety of sectors—be it government or private sector. Through the course offerings and teaching staff, I developed an interest in capital markets and regulatory decision-making. I took this interest and had the opportunity to work within the Ontario Public Service, helping to shape public policy issues and regulatory matters. Through this experience, I was able to build a strong network, which propelled me into the financial services sector working in Regulatory Compliance, Operational Risk, Data Management and Cybersecurity at the bank.

I have always wanted a career doing challenging cross-border and international work, and the JD/MGA program has allowed me to combine my interests in law and international affairs to do so. The combined program allowed me to gain hands-on experience to learn more about working in law in an international setting.

Through the MGA internship program and the IHRP fellowship, I got a chance to work at the Permanent Court of Arbitration in Singapore and the International Residual Mechanism for Former Criminal Tribunals in The Hague. These experiences, and the academics of the combined program, taught me how to work on complex files. I look forward to applying these skills while working at a large international law firm.

Student Leadership Initiatives

Munk School students participate in enriching experiences such as Student Leadership Initiatives, case competitions, and conferences. These hands-on opportunities from publishing journals to hosting podcasts and consulting on real-world issues help develop practical skills and enhance career readiness.

Experiential Learning Opportunities in MPP and MGA programs

Comparative Urban Governance

In February 2025, MPP students explored the question: What policy lessons can we learn from other cities? After studying comparative methods in Toronto, they traveled to London to examine community-led housing models. Through meetings with experts from the London School of Economics, the Greater London Authority, and local organizations, students gained practical insights applicable to Toronto's housing challenges.



European Governance

In February 2025, as part of an experiential course on European Governance and Policy, Master of Global Affairs (MGA) students traveled to Brussels, where they met with EU policymakers to discuss the war in Ukraine and the potential U.S. withdrawal from NATO.



Mentorship

The Munk School Mentorship Program connects students with Fellows, educators, policymakers, and private-sector leaders, providing valuable real-world guidance. Every student who requested a mentor was matched, reflecting the Fellows' strong commitment to student success and the School's emphasis on interdisciplinary, career-ready learning. Admissions - MPP & MGA degree programs

Admissions are holistic, with the MPP and MGA committees reviewing all aspects of your application. For details, visit munkschool.utoronto.ca/masters-programs.

Admissions requirements

Academic Record

You will have successfully completed a four-year Bachelor's degree (in any discipline) or equivalent, from a recognized university.

GPA Requirement

You are required to have a minimum Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of mid-B (3.0), and a Final year minimum GPA of B+ (3.3), of your last 300 and 400 level courses. Meeting this requirement does not guarantee admission due to high competition.

International Student Degree Equivalency Requirements

If you are an international student you should refer to [U of T's School of Graduate Studies International Equivalency tool](#) to find out if your degree meets the School of Graduate Studies requirements to apply. [Learn more: https://rb.gy/259ds9](#)

Quantitative & Qualitative Requirements

Success in the MGA & MPP programs requires both qualitative and quantitative skills, which you must demonstrate in your application.

English Language Proficiency Test

You are required to submit official [English test scores](#) if (a) you do not have a degree from a Canadian university and (b) the language of instruction and examination for your degree was not English. Learn more: <https://rb.gy/ngu3xx>

Other requirements

If your undergraduate degree was completed outside Canada, you must take the GRE General Test (www.ets.org/gre) for the MPP program only. The MGA program does not require the GRE.

Dual Degrees; Combined Degree Programs and Collaborative Specializations:

If applying to Dual or Combined Degree Programs, you must meet the requirements and deadlines for both programs. For Collaborative Specializations, you can apply after admission to the MGA or MPP programs.
